## *Message from the Warden*

### **Wisconsin Correctional Center System**

#### **Annual Report**

**October 1, 2007**

The Wisconsin state fiscal year July 2006 to June 2007 has once again shown the Wisconsin Correctional Center System's (WCCS) ability to manage change. New superintendents were appointed throughout the fiscal year at Black River, Gordon, Kenosha, and McNaughton Correctional Centers. A new Deputy Warden was hired in February 2007.

Each of the centers in WCCS continue to embrace, promote and expand on the re-entry philosophy of the Department of Corrections. Centers have again identified efforts taken during the year to enhance inmate success in the community. These efforts, along with the continued cooperation of the Division of Community Corrections, allow inmates to gain the "bridge to success" upon transition to the community and allow the center system to continue to protect the public by ensuring we operate safe and secure centers.

During the past year, WCCS placed 1,821 inmates in the community on work release. These inmates paid \$2,024,900 toward their room and board, \$582,378 toward child support, \$680,721 in court ordered obligations, \$947,660 for work release transportation fees, and \$20,675 to the Bureau of Health Services in Medical Co-Pay fees.

The Challenge Incarceration Programs (CIP) at Black River Correctional Center and St. Croix Correctional Center, as well as the Earned Release Program at the Drug Abuse Correctional Center had 600 men and 15 women graduate from the programs saving a total of 300,762 bed days.

As Warden of WCCS, I am proud of the accomplishments made at the 13 correctional centers and look forward to the challenges and changes of the coming fiscal year.

**Center Accomplishments:**

- ◆ Work crews provided over 42,000 hours to the local community, such as townships, cities, state and county agencies, schools and non-profit organizations. The majority of the hours are provided in the support of sixteen state and county parks located in Jackson and Clark Counties as well as the Black River State Forest and the maintenance of local ATV and ski trails.
- ◆ Black River Correctional Center and St. Croix Correctional Center continue to support each other and strive to provide one consistent and quality program for all Challenge Incarceration participants.
- ◆ 26 inmates received their instructional driving permits and/or driver's license was reinstated and 38 other inmates were taken to get state ID's.

**Restorative Justice Efforts**

- ◆ Inmates and staff donated \$423 to SOAR (Speaking Out About Rape) Operation Free Fall. SOAR is a nation wide campaign to raise awareness about sexual assault and victims. Inmate donated \$435 to RADD (Runners against Drunk Drivers). 13 inmates and Capt. Steindorf participated in the fun run.
- ◆ Staff w/ Inmates spoke at local schools and other organizations about making correct choices and the CIP program and prisons.
- ◆ Inmates assist in raising 2000 pheasants for Local Jackson County Wildlife Federation where they are released in Jackson County.
- ◆ 56 inmate received certificates of training in wildfire and firefighting from the DNR. Inmate crews assisted the DNR in several forest fires “mop up” operations this year.

**Programs Offered at the Center:**

**Military Bearing:**

This includes intensive instruction in military bearing, courtesy, drills and physical exercise. The inmates are oriented to this activity by Drill Instructors; however all staff reinforce concepts that support military bearing.

**Group:**

Both individual and group counseling approaches are an integral part of the program. Inmates participate in-group activities a minimum of 9.5 hours each week. Group/individual counseling focuses on criminal thinking and rational behavior therapy. At the end of each day, all inmates are required to complete a structured entry in their journals. The social workers are the primary case planners; however, treatment activities are facilitated by both treatment and security staff. Inmates who have completed the majority of their treatment needs and are in their final phase of the Challenge Incarceration Program are utilized in the peer treatment groups established for inmates in the early phases of the Challenge Incarceration Program.

**Education:**

A structured education program is part of every inmate's program. Emphasis is on ABE and HSED skill development. Those inmates who are already at or above these levels have individualized educational programs. Educational activities involve a minimum of 9.5 hours of classroom each week. Currently offering a building service certificate in Vocational Training as potentially inmates could earn 3 credits through WWTC for class. Each squad is held back two and a half days each week for educational and group counseling. There is also time set aside on the weekend for study time. Finally, due to the nature of the Challenge Incarceration Program education program, inmates with severe learning disabilities are not admitted to Challenge Incarceration Program.

**AODA:**

A condition of placement in the Challenge Incarceration Program is a chemical abuse assessment and subsequent treatment and education. Treatment is abstinence oriented. It is provided by certified AODA staff through contract and is facilitated by all staff. A minimum of 9.5 hours each week per inmate is dedicated to AODA treatment. Additional one-to-one and assignment work is completed outside of the group setting.

### **Programs Offered at the Center:**

#### **Earned Release Program (ERP) (Began March 2004)**

The 2003-2005 state budget, Wisconsin Act 33, included the creation of an Earned Release program within the Wisconsin Department of Corrections, Drug Abuse Correctional Center (DACC). This provision of the budget bill became effective July 26, 2003, and applies to certain inmates within the adult correctional system and those sentenced on or after the effective date of the bill. Offenders sentenced for crimes specified in Chapter 940 and specific subsections of Chapter 948 are not statutorily eligible for the program. (948.02, 948.025, 948.03, 948.05, 948.055, 948.06, 948.07, 948.075, 948.08 or 948.095)

The Earned Release Program is a 120 bed, six (6) month closed group program of ten (10) offenders per group housed in program units. Twenty two Social Workers, one Treatment Specialist, two Corrections Program Supervisors, and Superintendent maintain AODA credentials and provide the programming. The Earned Release Program serves substance abusing offenders. The Program's mission is to enhance safety in the community by providing a continuum of substance abuse treatment services. Services begin in a confined facility on a residential treatment unit and will continue with after, intensive supervision, and monitoring of alcohol/drug use throughout the offender's supervision in the community.

#### **Earned Release Program (OWI)**

OWI is a 100 bed, six- (6) month program for offenders convicted of operating a vehicle while impaired 5<sup>th</sup> offense or more, under Wisconsin Statutes 346.63 (1)(a). Program components include AODA education; dependency and addiction; modification of high risk and thrill-seeking behavior; rational behavior training; responsible decision-making; relapse prevention; and restorative justice.

#### **Community/Project Crews:**

Inmates awaiting program are provided work experience on these community project crews for up to 6 months. Crews operate all year but are most active from late April through early November.

**Programs Offered at the Center**

**Felony Drug Offender Alternative to Prison (FDOATP)**

The Chaney Center accepts offenders who have been placed on probation supervision by Milwaukee County Circuit Court and ordered to participate in the FDOATP as a condition of probation and as an alternative to being sentenced to prison. FDOATP Phase 2 offenders are placed at the Chaney Center for 90-120 days to begin work release and treatment programs including; mentoring, cognitive interventions, education and living skills. Offenders are transferred to Phase 3 FDOATP after court review and approval.

**\*Specialized Training Employment Program (STEP)**

Inmates are transferred to the Chaney Center after completing education and specific employment skill training at maximum and medium security institutions under the direction of the Bureau of Correctional Enterprises. Chaney Center staff work with the inmate to develop a community work release employment opportunity that matches the skills learned through BCE.

**Nurturing Fathers (13 week Pilot Program)** The emphasis of the program is the development of attitudes and skills for male nurturance. The program also focuses on analyzing the dynamics of anger and identifying tools to manage such. Conflict resolution and the development of communication skills are also key components of the program

**Programs Offered at the Center:**

**AODA Residential**

Facilitated by ATTIC Correctional Enterprises this substance abuse program is designed for the inmate or ATR offender with an identified substance abuse history. This program is specifically designed for the lower literacy inmate. Participants require an identified 6.0 or lower reading level to participate. Modules deal with substance abuse issues, CGIP and other elements designed to change criminality. This is a 16 week program. It is a residential program in which all participants begin at the same time. FCC currently operates two groups and it is anticipated a third group will be added in early 2008.

**Wood Shop**

This is an open ended assignment in which men assigned to the wood shop will learn basic woodworking skills under the supervision of the shop supervisor. Participants build a variety of wood products such as cabinets, wardrobe closets, desks, cedar chests, cutting boards and other products. Many of the products built are then utilized by other WCCS sites. Also, products are provided to community organizations as donations to support their cause as part of our commitment to both Community Service and Restorative Justice. FCC is fostering a relationship with BCE to also provide products for their marketing.

**Cognitive Intervention Program 1&2 (CGIP)**

This is a program in which participants are given an opportunity to reflect on their thinking processes, to focus on choices made in their lives which have led them to criminal activity. The intent of the program is to help participants develop new thinking patterns and provide them with greater choices in their lives.

**GED/HSED**

FCC has 1.5 FTE educational staff who work with inmates and ATR offenders and assist them in pursuing their High School Equivalency Diploma. The education staff work with both general population men as well as men assigned to the AODA program. They work very closely with the AODA participants to assist them in raising their literacy level.

**Driver Education**

FCC education staff assist men in obtaining their driver's license. They work with men who have never had a license in obtaining a temporary license. They also work with men who have had a license and the Department of Motor Vehicles to determine what is needed to reinstate licenses. FCC teacher also is able to van certify drivers.

**Pre-Release and Reintegration**

Staff work with inmates individually and in group to assist with pre-release planning and life skills. Among other things they assist with career counseling, job searches, resume development, obtaining social security cards and other identification needed to secure employment. Inmates leave the Center with a hard copy and computer disk resume and cover letter. Staff also interact with other governmental agencies, such as Social Security and Veterans Affairs, to assist inmates eligible for benefits to apply for these so that they are available upon release.

### **Programs Offered at the Center:**

#### **AODA 5B**

This is a four month substance abuse program for inmates and ATR offenders. It is a cognitive based substance abuse program that deals with substance abuse issues and breaking the cycle of criminal behavior. It also incorporates CGIP 1&2. It is a residential program in which all participants begin and end at the same time. Reservations for the program are made through the GCC Social Worker.

#### **CGIP 1&2**

The Cognitive Intervention Program is designed for inmates with an identified CGIP need. Its intent is to address critical thinking. It is designed to provide participants with more positive choices and solutions with the aim being to adopt more pro-social behavior.

#### **HSED**

GCC has a full time teacher who works with inmates and ATR offenders and assists them in an academic setting in pursuing their High School Equivalency Diploma. Inmates assigned to GCC can take tests on site in pursuit of their diploma.

#### **Drivers License**

The GCC teacher provides assistance in the form of classroom training to assist men in obtaining their driver's license if they have never had one. Staff will also assist men who have had a license in the past renew that license in cooperation with the Department of Motor Vehicles. Staff will also work with inmates to enable them to be van certified.

#### **Work Release**

GCC provides work release opportunities at Jack Link's Snacks in Minong. Currently have a crew on all three shifts with an increase to a total of 35 inmates have an opportunity, if classified minimum community, to earn funds for release and to use to pay financial obligations. GCC also currently provides a crew of up to 5 men to work constructing, insulating and refurbishing low cost housing with Indianhead Action Agency. Work going well that agency would like another crew of 3 to 5 inmates in another area.

#### **Pre-Release Planning**

GCC provides opportunities for inmates and ATR offenders to prepare for release and positive reintegration in their community of release. In cooperation with ATTIC Correctional Services, a staff member works with inmates both individually and in group to develop pre-release plans, explore employment opportunities and develop a resume, obtain social security card and other necessary identification. Staff also work with other governmental agencies, such as Social Security and Veteran's Affairs, to enable inmates being released to apply for available benefits.

### **Programs Offered at the Center:**

#### ***AODA Level 2 Aftercare***

A 10-week open ended program for any inmate that completed Level 5 AODA programming or has been assessed by A&E as needing level 2 aftercare. The primary focus is relapse prevention which includes strategies and action step to abstain from drug and alcohol. The program is facilitated by Genesis Behavioral Services at KCC.

#### **Specialized Training and Employment Program (STEP)**

STEP is a transition program that teaches and assists inmates in seeking and maintaining employment. Phase 1 of program begins at RCI with training and preparation for a job. During Phase 2 of the program, the inmate is transferred to KCC and is assisted in acquiring and maintaining employment in the community. Phase 3 is the final phase and designed to provide continued support and assistance to maintain employment after release.

#### **Narcotics Anonymous**

Voluntary self help program open to all inmates that have a drug addiction problem. The group is facilitated by community volunteers and meetings held both on and off grounds.

#### **Alcoholics Anonymous**

Voluntary self help program open to all inmates that have an alcohol addiction problem. The group is facilitated by community volunteers and meetings held on grounds.

#### **KCC/RYOFC Reintegration Program- CORE**

A multi phase reintegration program for RYOFC inmates being release to Racine and Kenosha County. The program which begins at RYOFC consists of a 16 week session that provides information regarding community services available, promotes responsible life style, enhances communication skill, and educates inmates on health care issues, parenting, employment and services. Inmates that complete this phase of the program are eligible for transfer to KCC. Once at KCC the inmates will be placed into a work release job that they can stay in after release. KCC provides additional assistance and support to ensure job retention and to assist in a smooth transition back to their families and home.

On the fourth day of classes, a representative from the Department of Motor Vehicles comes to the Center to administer the permit test. After earning the driver’s permit, eligible inmates can participate in Behind the Wheel Driver’s Instruction.

**Behind the Wheel Driver’s Instruction-**

Upon receipt of a driver’s permit, eligible inmates can participate in Behind the Wheel Driver’s Instruction lessons offered through Easy Method Driving School. Upon completing the Behind the Wheel Driver’s Instruction lessons, inmates take their behind the wheel road test. Instruction and test vehicles are supplied by Easy Method Driving School.

**Programs Offered at the Center:**

**AODA Aftercare Program:**

This ten week program is an aftercare program which focuses on maintaining recovery, relapse prevention, skills to address healthy relationships, the concepts of restorative justice and community service as well as responsible living. All inmates who arrive at OCC with an identified AODA need will be expected to participate in this aftercare program.

**ABE/HSED Program:**

In conjunction with a grant from MATC, OCC is able to offer academic programming approximately 6 hours per week. This program is offered at various times of the day and evening so as to allow all inmates to participate, including those on work release. Inmates may participate in ABE Basic, GED and HSED programming or academic refresher programming. Participation is expected for inmates who have not attained a GED/HSED.

**Employment Readiness Training:**

This program was designed to assist inmates in preparing for their return to the community/placement at a work release site. Completion of application forms to interviewing skills to skill enhancement practice regarding interviewing skills and getting along with others at the work site are addressed. The OCC Employment Support Specialist provides this program.

**Alcoholics Anonymous:**

This program is a self-help support for individuals struggling with maintaining their sobriety. Inmates who routinely participate in the on-grounds A.A. program are also allowed to attend off-grounds support meetings.

**Programs Offered at the Center:**

**Military Bearing:**

This includes intensive instruction in military bearing, courtesy, drills and physical exercise. The inmates are oriented to this activity by Drill Instructors; however all staff reinforce concepts that support military bearing.

**Group Treatment:**

Both individual and group counseling approaches are an integral part of the program. Inmates participate in group activities a minimum of 9.5 hours each week. Group/individual counseling focuses on criminal thinking and rational behavior therapy. At the end of each day, all inmates are required to complete a structured entry in their journals. The social workers are the primary case planners; however, treatment activities are facilitated by both treatment and security staff. Inmates who have completed the majority of their treatment needs and are in their final phase of the Challenge Incarceration Program are utilized in the peer treatment groups established for inmates in the early phases of the Challenge Incarceration Program.

**Educational Programming:**

A structured education program is part of every inmate's program. Emphasis is on ABE and HSED skill development. Those inmates who are already at or above these levels have individualized educational programs. The education planning is done by the education staff, with supportive services provided by treatment and security staff. Educational activities involve a minimum of 9.5 hours of classroom each week. Each squad is held back two and a half days each week for educational and group counseling. There is also time set aside on the weekend for study time. Finally, due to the nature of the Challenge Incarceration Program education program, inmates with severe learning disabilities are not admitted to Challenge Incarceration Program.

**Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Treatment:**

A condition of placement in the Challenge Incarceration Program is a chemical abuse assessment and subsequent treatment and education. Treatment is abstinence oriented. It is provided by certified AODA staff through contract and is facilitated by all staff. A minimum of 9.5 hours each week per inmate is dedicated to AODA treatment. Additional one-to-one and assignment work is completed outside of the group setting.

- ◆ Inmates scheduled to be released from TCC and into the Dane County area have also been afforded the opportunity to attend a Service Fair provided by MUM. A variety of service providers are available to disseminate information on potential resources available to the offenders upon their release/return to the community.
- ◆ TCC and MUM have joined to allow Dane County inmates attend Voices Beyond Bars every other Tuesday evening. This is a support group for ex-inmates in the community. This group offers realistic insight for the inmates returning home with in 4 months.
- ◆ During this reporting period 57 inmates acquired their driver's license prior to their release and 30 inmates received their driving permit.
- ◆ TCC offenders are taken to the local Job Center approximately one month prior to their anticipated release date. This allows offenders to register with Job Service, be reviewed for potential Veteran's services, seminar for techniques for interviewing with barriers and participate in a budgeting presentation. All offenders being released, regardless of their county of conviction attend these sessions.

**Programs Offered at the Center:**

**AODA Level 2 Program:**

This ten week program is an aftercare program which focuses on maintaining recovery, relapse prevention, skills to address healthy relationships, the concepts of restorative justice and community service as well as responsible living. All inmates who arrive at TCC with an identified AODA need are expected to participate in this aftercare program.

**ABE/HSED Program:**

In conjunction with a grant from MATC, TCC is able to offer academic programming approximately 17 hours per week. This program is offered at various times of the day and evening so as to allow all offenders to participate, including those on work release. Offenders may participate in ABE Basic, GED and HSED programming or academic refresher programming. Participation is expected for offenders who have not attained a GED/HSED.

**Employment Readiness Training:**

This program was designed to assist inmates in preparing for their return to the community/placement at a work release site. Completion of application forms to interviewing skills to skill enhancement practice regarding interviewing skills and getting along with others at the work site are addressed. The TCC Employment Support Specialist provides this program.

**Alcoholics' Anonymous:**

This program is a self-help support for individuals struggling with maintaining their sobriety. Inmates who routinely participate in the on-grounds AA program are also allowed to attend off-grounds support meetings.
